Right now he is part of a team studying the economic impact of cruise tourism in Atlantic Canada

Through his writings Dr Klein is popularly known as the 'cruise junkie' and his website is a resource for '*other information* about the cruise industry'.

In his presentation the audience will hear about such things as: passenger influx, people pollution, 'getting ugly', infrastructure costs, 'cruise ship days' and passenger on-shore spend.

A spokesperson for PAG commented:

"A £60 million deep-water terminal, promoted to Government by the IOM Shipping Association, is a huge investment. What's suitable for Liverpool or Orkney may not be so for the Isle of Man. The public deserves to know the full potential impact of cruise ship tourism on our economy and environment. We are pleased that Dr Klein will provide some balance over the proposition. We sincerely hope that people will come along and join in the discussion in the relaxed atmosphere of the Manx Legion Club. The event is free and all are welcome."
